

THE ORIGINS OF PRESIDENT'S DAY



President's Day, celebrated on the third Monday in February, celebrates the birthday of George Washington (born February 22nd, 1732). Following Washington's death in 1799, his birthday became a perennial day of remembrance. Though it was celebrated through most of the 1800s, Washington's Birthday was not recognized officially as a federal holiday until the 1870s. It joined four other nationally recognized federal bank holidays- Christmas, New Years Day, Independence Day and Thanksgiving but was the first to celebrate the life of an Individual American.

In the late 1960s, Congress proposed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act to shift the celebration of several federal holidays from specific dates to a series of pre-determined Mondays. This began the transition of "Washington's Birthday" to "President's Day" as we know it, as the Act also included a provision to combine the celebration of Washington's birthday with Abraham Lincoln's which fell on February 12th. However, the proposal to rename the holiday was met with contention from

lawmakers in George Washington's home state of Virginia and was eventually dropped.

By the mid-1980s, Washington's Birthday was known to many Americans as President's Day. By the 2000s nearly half of the United States had changed the holiday's name to President's Day on their calendars.

While Washington and Lincoln remain the most largely recognized leaders on this day, President's Day is now popularly seen as a day to recognize the lives and achievements of all of America's chief executives. Some lawmakers have objected to this view, arguing that grouping George Washington and Abraham Lincoln with less successful presidents minimizes their legacies. The federal government holds fast to the original incarnation of the holiday as a celebration of the country's first president. The third Monday in February is still listed on official calendars as Washington's Birthday.
